We had four demonstrators working on the night.

### *Ian Cameron*

Ian started the evening showing how he toms a sphere. He measures the diameter and then transfers this to the length and with a parting tool defines the dimensions. He then turns by eye to produce the sphere. For the final completion of the sphere and removal of the spigots he uses his homemade hemi-spherical chuck made from plastic pipe fittings. He followed this by allowing some of the newer members to have a go at turning something.



### *Maurice Sore*

Maurice started out with the intention of turning a device to hold a ball of wool so that it could be unwound in use without rolling about the floor. He mounted a piece on the lathe and scouted to turn it to the round but that was as far as it got. Much discussion followed but not a lot of turning. He did produce a piece later to show what he intended to make.



### *Tic Challis*

Tic brought along some pieces that she was working on with pyrography.

Her evening was spent showing how she puts the design on to the piece and then how She actually burns in the design.

There was a lot of discussion about the merits of one type of tool over another and Tic's enthusiasm shone through.



### *Mike Charnley*

It was a pleasure to see Mike turning, he had a piece of wet sycamore mounted on the lathe and showed how he turns a hollow form in the shape of an egg.
